

June 2024 circulation totaled 30,893. Overall circulation continues to improve but remains slightly lower than pre-pandemic totals. E-materials circulation remains high and accounts for approximately 28% of total circulation for 2024, so far.






Adult Services (submitted by Jonathan Trice):

Starting this month, we're changing the format of our report to include a more thorough snapshot of library services. With the Makerspace up and running and the new website launching, I felt that this was a good time to start sharing more about other areas of the library.

For the month of June, Sam and I put a massive amount of work into the new website to prepare it for a soft launch on July 15th with an official launch date of August 1st. While the site will be available to the public for two weeks before the launch, we will be collecting user feedback and apply any changes that will improve accessibility. The main structure of the site is currently solidified, but we will continue to add additional content and features in the coming months.

The site is built on the newest version of WordPress, and we are using the Gutenberg Block editor, which is far superior to the visual editor we used for our previous site. Once we familiarize ourselves with the editor after a bit of a learning curve, we learned that we could create a much more attractive, user-friendly, and content-rich site for the library.

Adult Programming (submitted by Sam Sorensen):

A total of 854 patrons attended Adult and General Interest programs at Tredyffrin, which feels around average for our numbers. This means we didn't necessarily experience a summer lull in attendance (at least not yet). We hosted two successful concerts, including the Colors of Violin performance by Pt.

Milind Raikar. A patron kindly worked with me to organize this performance for the community, and 56 people attended. Adult Summer Reading also officially started on June 14th. In June, 41 adults signed up, and many have been excited about winning prizes—who wouldn't be? I was also able to lend my skill set from a previous life as a managing editor to the new website build by editing and writing new copy.

We have had a month of showcasing strong partnerships, which is fantastic. We hosted another SEPTA Senior Key Card Sign-Up event with Rep. Shusterman's office staff, and they registered 42 people. SEPTA's sign-up portal crashed *just* before the event started, but we were able to chat with patrons until it came back online. Our Lunch & Learn series with Valley Forge Park Alliance started in June on the anniversary of D-Day with a talk on D-Day representation in video games and movies. We had great turnout with 27 folks, and the subsequent series talks have been equally successful. Nora Gair, the Community Programs Associate at People's Light, sent me a quick note to thank us for the display we set up in June and stated, "The lobby display for *Off By One* is a big hit!" She also reached out for us to do the display for their last play of the season, *Somewhere Over the Border*.

Looking forward, we will be implementing user feedback to improve the website, and I am working on solidifying program plans for the fall and winter. We are reaching out to past performers and trying new programs, such as chair yoga. I am also in the process of developing challenges for time indoors and collaborating with new partners.

Makerspace (submitted by Amy Moscia):

The Makerspace has been busy! We launched Open Makerspace Hours, and they have been popular with all ages. We are currently reworking the policy for Open Makerspace Hours.

The Makerspace also opened up individual appointments, and 30+ were scheduled for the month of June. Patrons worked on independent projects with Makerspace staff assistance. Patrons submitted projects such as garden flags, custom tote bags, wooden engraved photos, and multiple 3D-printed designs.

Makerspace programs for all ages were in high demand. Many held large waitlists, which we use as data for planning additional programs. Family Makerspace programs have also been requested and are being worked into the schedule. Fall programs are in the works with plans to add daytime adult events and a recurring homeschool group that will meet twice a month to start.

Last but not least, the Makerspace received a FLITE grant for \$5,000. We purchased supplies, equipment, and more with these funds.

Summer reading is off and running! Our kickoff event was Friday, June 14th, around 150 people stopped in to sign up for our summer programs. Adults, teens, and kids' were represented and received sign ups. For the children we had the sign up table, 3 different crafts, and bean bag toss set up. Children who signed up received a summer reading passport and tote bag. The children have a reading challenge and learning challenges that earn them raffle tickets towards prizes all summer long. Prize winners are pulled every 2 weeks but there are also some grand prizes that they can enter for all summer long.

Other program highlights include a visit from Eyes of the Wild, an animal rescue/sanctuary, tote bag painting, and a makerspace program with the laser engraver. The educator from Eyes of the Wild brought 6 animals for us to meet and learn about: a sugar glider, a hedgehog, a ferret, a millepied, an armadillo, and a wallaby. We learned a lot and had a good time! Another day, summer reading participants were invited to bring their tote bags back to the library to paint them, using amazing paint markers we recently purchased. At the end of the month the makerspace had a program where the children drew a picture on the iPads and then we used the laser engraver to put that picture on a piece of wood for a door sign!

Summer has been so fun so far and we've only just begun!

Teen Programming (Submitted by Laurie Doan)

Teens in June held our monthly events including: board game and cards night, teen book groups, weekly crochet club, Switch on the big screen, chess, and our Roundtable Discussion Dinner.

Teen Librarian, Laurie Doan, attended the graduations of two of our Teen Advisory Board members held on the same night; one at Teamer Field in Berwyn and one at the Villanova University's Finneran Pavilion.

Conestoga's Desi Club transformed Tredyffrin Library's meeting room into a thriving hub of South Asian culture. The annual Desi Night event united more than 50 students from different cultural backgrounds. Photos and a news story are here: Desi Club hosts Desi Night – The SPOKE

Tredyffrin teens learned the history of the Radnor Fire Company while dining al fresco on the porch of the Radnor Memorial Library. We then walked over to the firehouse where we were given a detailed tour including: equipment, living space, the apparatus and the historical archives. Our final stop was at MAD ANTHONY WAYNE CAFÉ at the Wayne Station for a taste of their authentic gelato.

We are researching best practices with regard to our web presence for teens. We want to continue to update frequently with details of our programs and provide a one-stop shop for our recommendations and extra services.
